Service, Therapy and Emotional Support Dogs

...Professionals, with Credentials

It comes as no surprise that people who want one of the above type of dogs look for them in shelters. Obviously, they are animal lovers and want to save one that needs a home, but it is important to understand what is involved in being a "professional" dog before picking one out.

First and foremost, realize that this is a big responsibility for a dog, and they usually have no choice in the matter. That is why it's important that the search is focused on dogs who will

enjoy this job instead of finding the cutest one.

Service Dogs receive very specialized training. We know them as Seeing-Eye Dogs who help the blind, Physical Assistance Dogs who help the disabled, etc. Training for these dogs usually starts while babies from specially planned litters. They must be impeccably house trained, well-socialized with many humans and other animals and desensitized to many different environments. This training is usually carried out in specialized foster homes. At a certain age, they are re-evaluated and the ones who make the grade are sent to more specialized training for their specific profession. A lot of time, energy and money is invested in these dogs and the ones who don't make it into the special programs go on to serve in other ways or be fabulous pets. Service Dogs can accompany their owner almost anywhere and the handler should carry proof of their designated status.

Therapy Dogs are the ones who visit nursing homes and schools. Their training often begins as pups but they can be trained at any age if the temperament is otherwise suitable. They need to learn all of what is considered basic obedience, often receiving Canine Good Citizen status before going on to train and test for Therapy Dog certification. Many shelter dogs are suitable for this job, and most shelters will gladly cooperate with anyone looking for a dog to train for Therapy work. Potential handlers should do their homework and/or work with a professional to help them choose well.

Emotional Support Dogs are meant to be comforting companions for people with mental and emotional disorders. No certification or training is required, however, perhaps it should be.





Tucker and Sadie are getting along very well. He is getting to be more interested in Casper, but is respectful of her. Sadie and Tucker are both




now are instigating a bit of play, Tucker is by far the most frequent instigator. They are very good together. He is doing ok with his house training.

With proper documentation of need from a Therapist or Physician, they are supposed to be allowed to live with their owner even in rental housing where pets aren't allowed. The can also accompany their owner on airplanes, where manners would certainly be important. Their special designation does not allow them into all public areas in the same way that Service Dogs are. Special care must be taken in choosing an Emotional Support Dog. Puppies are automatically excluded because they just add more stress to any situation. It is recommended that young adults, at least a year if not two years old be considered. By then, they're already house trained and adult temperament is apparent. Shelter staff can probably be of great assistance if seekers enter the process with no pre-conceived notions of what kind of cute little fluffy puppy they want.

More than once, we have witnessed the heartbreak of Emotional Support Animals surrendered to the Humane Society. This is especially tragic because it should almost never happen. One day, they have a job and lots of attention and then next, they are left behind. Unfortunately, the human, who has his/her own issues, is not always equipped to handle the issues of the pet they chose, or someone gave to them. Unfortunately for the pet, they are sometimes replaced by another Emotional Support Animal. If you or someone you know is thinking of obtaining an Emotional Support Animal, please enlist the help of a professional.

Another important consideration is the cost of daily and veterinary care. As soon as a potential cat or dog is identified, a veterinary exam should come before a commitment to the pet, if possible. That's a good time to make sure the owner understands what the yearly cost of veterinary care will be, figure the cost of a recommended food and other needed supplies and services, such as training and grooming.

In summary, Service Dogs are very expensive and usually obtained through a specialized training program. Therapy Dogs don't need to cost much up front, but do have to be kept up to date on vaccinations, free from parasites and well-groomed in order to fulfill the requirements. Emotional Support Animals don't need to be expensive either, but plans must also be in place for their expenses through retirement. Everyone needs to be wary of scam websites that promise paperwork, vests and everything your dog needs to get a free pass anywhere you want to go. It just doesn't work that way!

The end result should always be an animal who is as happy to serve his/her human as the human is to care for the animal.



The Aging Pet

Older pets are a wonderful part of the pet population. While everyone loves a new kitten or puppy, there is something very special about a senior pet. While many pets grow older in an owner's home, a surprising number of them also show up in shelters for a variety of reasons. Adopting an older pet can be challenging, especially if they have special needs. That being said, even pets in private homes can be difficult to provide care for a based on an owners willingness to do so.

Older pets can be a challenge to care for should they develop age related problems. Older cats are susceptible to a variety of metabolic problems such as diabetes, kidney failure, liver problems, and thyroid issues. Physical problems such as arthritis and dental disease are also common. Older dogs can suffer from a large spectrum or problems. Many are related to the breed or size of the dog. Heart problems are common in many toy breeds. Arthritis is common in large breed dogs. Hormonal disorders (thyroid disease, Cushing's disease, diabetes) can occur in almost any dog. Unspayed female dogs are susceptible mammary cancer and uterine infections. Skin tumors are also common in aging pets (as are internal tumors, especially involving the liver and spleen). The list could go on and on.



The bottom line is that older pets need more care than the younger or middle aged pet. As a pet grows older, in an ideal world, they would have regular veterinary exams, routine blood work to detect any internal problems, and other diagnostic tests as indicated. Based on these findings, any detected problems may or may not need attention. This could be a change in diet, medications, supplements and even surgical considerations. Again, this is the ideal world.

In reality, many clients question how much they are willing to spend on an older dog or cat. The investment in their care is frequently based on how much time the pet is expected to live. In short, it is age discrimination. Many feel that the cost of care must insure that the pet will survive for a given length of time. Of course, this is not reasonable from a medical standpoint. There are no guarantees in medicine. Many times, faith in the future is an important factor...

Sometimes the only old age care a pet receives is euthanasia when an owner determines that this is the best outcome. I cannot tell you how many euthanasias we do when it is the first veterinary visit in years. Other clients will invest in their aging pet, to a varying degree. Every client has a different degree of commitment to their pet. From my perspective as a veterinarian, I usually wish that it was more than what it was.

At the same time, what I refer to as age discrimination is understandable. Facing large and potentially on-going veterinary costs for an uncertain future is something that has to weigh heavily on a pet owner. That is something that every pet owner has to individually decide, and it is not the role of the veterinary profession to pass judgment, but rather to help those who request it.

Two years ago, my thirteen year old Doolie was not doing well. She was overweight and lethargic. Her hearing was starting to go, and her bloodwork was indicative of a hormonal disorder called Cushing's disease. At the time, I was uncertain as to how long I would have her. I put her on a weight loss diet and also started her on Selegiline, a medication for Cushings and cognitive dysfunction (a common aging change, basically, doggy dementia). Today, at 15 ½ years old, I still have her. She is arthritic and slow moving and has other aging issues, but her quality of life is good. She is on medication for her arthritis as well as for urinary incontinence. I do regular blood work on her to monitor her liver issues, as well as x-rays to monitor her liver and spleen. I brush her teeth regularly, which she tolerant of, and I do my best to keep her moving with mild exercise. My investment in her has



been well worth it. The extra two years means the world to me. I cannot say that this would be everyone's experience with an aging, older pet, but without the effort, I never would have known. Had I decided to not step up her level of care and I lost her prematurely, I would have always wondered if I could have done more for her. Just one person's testimony for caring for an older pet.

Winter Carnival Ice Sculpting


